
4-Semester Study & Gen Ed Assessments

- 4-semester study
 - Most departments finished up either semester 3 or 4 at the end of fall 2021.
 - Maeve will be reaching out to each department as needed this semester.
- Gen-Ed Assessments:
 - Working on analyzing the data gathered from the Cultural Responsiveness study.
 - Study of Oral and Written Communication starting soon. Brandon Bumstead and Jen Asimow are co-chairing the study and will be presenting on it tomorrow.

Co-curricular Assessment

- The Assessment Committee is now includes co-curricular assessment, which is being spearheaded by Associate Dean Allison Zures. Each department is now working on a 4-semester study to understand a learning situation of interest.
- Advising: assessing learning navigation of the academic-experience through advising appointments.
- TRiO: assessing the implementation, execution and evaluation of a Financial Literacy program for all TRiO- Student Support Services program participants.
- Transfer: assessing students learning around utilizing transfer guides.
- Career Services: assessing the effectiveness of mock interviews for cosmetology students.
- Veterans Services: assessing workshops related to student veterans transition from the military to higher education

Closing the Loop



"Assessment helps the program determine how well it is achieving its outcomes and suggest effective steps for improvement... You don't need to collect data you don't use; it's much more important to collect a small amount of useful data than to proliferate data that sit in a drawer or on a computer file. If you are collecting information you are not using, either start using it or stop collecting it. Instead of focusing on compliance, focus on the information you need for wise action."
