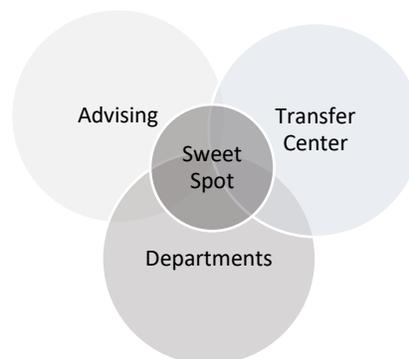
College life is filled with learning and learning-adjacent experiences. Most learning-adjacent (or co-curricular) experiences, done well, support student learning, growth and development.

Suskie¹ (2014) describes five dimensions of quality co-curricular experiences.

1. Focus – each unit has clear goals and designs experiences in order to meet them.
2. Relevance- well-designed co-curricular experiences meet students needs and consider the needs of the workforce and the community.
3. Community – excellent co-curricular design is integrated with other units or departments, is collegial in nature and works in tandem with the rest of the college to meet larger institutional goals.
4. Evidence – co-curricular assessment asks that units systematically collect evidence of learning.
5. Betterment – Just like in all other areas of assessment, quality co-curricular assessment uses the collected evidence to make changes that improve student learning.

What is Co-Curricular Assessment	What Co-Curricular Assessment is Not
Collecting evidence of student learning attainment as a result of one-on-one tutoring in the Math Center.	The frequency that students attend tutoring.
In conjunction with the Humanities Department, and using the SLOs from Women and Film, offering a week of women-directed films and discussions to support students as they complete their final projects in Women and Film.	Evaluation of a guest speaker.
Teaching students to navigate Transferology and collecting evidence that they have learned this skill and are able to apply it on their own.	Job attainment after graduation.
