ALBERT SOGLIN

For nearly 15 years, until his death in 1976, Albert Soglin taught mathematics at Harold Washington College, which was called Loop College at the time. Al loved teaching math to students from diverse backgrounds, and greatly valued knowledge and a just society. He also enjoyed working and occasionally arguing with his colleagues. He was active the in the Cook County Teachers Union 1600.



Al earned an Associate degree from Herzl Junior College (now Malcom X College) in 1938. He then studied education at Chicago Teachers College from 1939-1942.

Al was born in Chicago in 1918 to Jewish immigrants from Russia. He and his wife, Rose, raised their five children on Chicago's South Side and in Highland Park.

Albert (Al) completed his bachelor's degree in education. He then earned bachelor's and master's degrees in math from the Illinois Institute of Technology. Before joining Loop College, Al taught at other schools in the Chicago area.

The Beatrice Orzac Scholarship for languages & music students established in memory of Beatrice Orzac. A gifted violinist who was able to learn many foreign languages using her musical talents.

Thomas J. McBride was born on August 24, 1972 and spent his early years in Oak Park, Illinois. When his family moved to St. Charles, Illinois, Tom went on to araduate from St. Charles High School and attended the University of Kansas, Lawrence, Kansas. After his first year at the University of Kansas, Tom moved to the City of Chicago where he worked at Starbucks and later as a bike messenger for Cannonball Messenger Service. A self-taught musician, he performed with several bands around the city. Tom was an avid writer having kept a personal journal since age 13 as well as composing many essays and poems concerning a wide range of topics. From time to time during this period, he enrolled in evening classes at Harold Washington College. In the fall of 1998, he transferred to the University of Illinois Chicago Campus

Due to his often-expressed admiration of Harold Washington College and its professors, Tom's family established the Thomas J. McBride Memorial Scholarship in his memory.
