

If you want to go far, it takes Community

Y ou know the saying, "If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together"? Being a student at Harold Washington College gave true meaning to that.

Born and raised on the southside of Chicago, there aren't a lot of



narratives that tell young people they can not only dream up the craziest things, but that they can achieve them. When the time came, City Colleges was the best option for me to attend college AT LEAST, and I took two classes at Wright College before transferring to Harold Washington College for its convenient location. As a working student, a commuting student, and someone who was spending a lot of time helping my family out, school wasn't my greatest priority. I did well my first few semesters but with a death in my family, I completely disengaged and failed an entire semester's worth of courses. I gave up on school and focused on work instead.

I was working and making money, but I missed the classroom. I also knew by now that you can't go far without a formal education. Instead of school being less important, it became that much more important to any hopes for a career, so, I petitioned for re-enrollment and hit the ground running. More determined than ever, I took different classes to learn more about my interests, strengths and weaknesses.

At Harold, I met professors like Marcy Henry, Jeff Daniels, Juan Martinez, Dave Richardson and many others that helped shape my mind. I met Directors and Administrators like Angela Guernica, Ellen Goldberg, Former HWC President Margie Martin, and even board members and the new Chancellor, Dr. Juan Salgado that helped shaped my drive. I met like-minded students, especially in the Student Government Association that helped shape my desire to give back. I completed an internship with WYCC, PBS Chicago and US Senator, Richard Durbin. But my turning point was taking the Transfer Leadership class with Ellen.

Through these hands-on sessions, I had a chance to see what all of this meant. Up until then, I was just taking classes, giving back where I saw fit, and completing internships that aligned with my professional goals. But after completing the course, I finally found the reason why. I remembered my dream school.

Harold Washington taught me that Community College was not the LEAST I could do. It was much more. Through *continued on page 8...*

many ups and downs in my personal, academic and career life, I realized that it was meant for me and time would prove that I was meant for it too.

I had always focused on the "College" part but never the "Community" part but my last semester at Harold, I became more involved. I was in clubs like O.L.A.S., Writing Club, and S.A.F.E., but my last semester, I joined PTK and I became the Senate Chair of the Student Government Association Senate. Alongside incredible students, we worked tirelessly on our student government budget issues with CCC district office. That year, the senate spoke with HWC faculty, administration, students and CCC administration. We attended a panel with former President Obama, we met the (then) new Chancellor and even Mayor Rahm Emanuel, by chance. We worked with City College Presidents and other SGA teams. We didn't know then what we had sparked but looking back now, the Spring 2017 semester was a special community of empowered students who wanted to create change. I take that with me wherever I go. And now...

In Fall 2018, I'll start my second year at Columbia University's School of General Studies in New York city where I live on campus. Through my work study, I work for an organization that houses 28 community programs throughout Harlem, Washington Heights and Morningside. They do this by bringing Columbia and Barnard student volunteers to these areas to teach ESOL, GED, and offer programs for kids. In October, we held a gala that honored our former Dean and astronaut Mike Massimo. It was amazing! Last year, I joined two organizations - LeanIn, a nationally recognized women's empowerment organization, and First-Generation Low Income Partnerships (F.L.I.P.) where I sat on the board and will do this again to continue to work for these underrepresented groups. As a first-year student, I received the high honor of a Service Award which recognizes students who give back to the Columbia Community, and I was truly humbled and shocked. In a sea of thousands of students, I couldn't imagine creating any impact but now I can't imagine doing anything else. I wouldn't have made it to Columbia without that last special semester and in fact, I had already been accepted but chose to defer so I could complete

my Associate's Degree and work in the SGA. It took me over 10 years to complete my Associate's and took



additional time before transferring. At Harold, I learned the meaning of the Community part of Community College. And now I try to create community wherever I go.

I only have one piece of advice for any student considering your dream school. Attach yourself to more than a grade, more than a classroom, more than the outcome. Because it will never go as planned. And you will fail - a lot, and in ways you never even thought you could fail! But having the support it takes to stay focused and committed to your dreams, you learn the value of the other word, community. If I didn't fail all my classes that semester, I wonder where I'd be right now. Maybe I'd have gotten there faster. But like the saying goes, "If you want to go fast, go alone. I wanted to go far, go together."
